Isidor Bajić Music School (Novi Sad)





Irina Mints: "Variations on a theme of Bach"
William Coburn: "Frolicky Rolicky Wind"



Irina Mints is a concert pianist, music educator with great success in training young pianists and the author of the modern piano teaching method and the textbook. An homage to a well-known and popular piece by J.S.Bach: Minuet in G Major BWV, anh. 114pm. The variations are composed in different genres and tempos. Each variation has its own coloring sheet used to express different emotions. The colourful pictures intensify the impression of the music.

William Coburn, a 20th century composer wrote a small cheerful children's piece named Frolicky Rolicky Wind. This is a children's piano solo in a b a form written with implemented side notes in the sheet (to accent the music story) about the witch being and then casting a spell and then ending up being the Frolicky Wind, that is why the witch is on a broom on the cover of the original book.
